Libre as a standard on which to profitably build: The value of Legal Information Institutes disseminating primary law and standards and the opportunities for proprietary enhancements

14:55 - 15:25

- Non-patent intellectual property that is publicly created ought to be disseminated on a libre basis by credible public interest information institutes (such as the FALM LIIs):
 - Standards that are documented in a manner that requires adopters or implementers to pay a fee for the documentation impair their own adoption and if given effect legal force are an obstacle to a free growing economy. (Argument on ethical principles)
 - Further that there is a considerable body of "law tech" and "legal information" that can be built on a proprietary basis in a complementary fashion. (Argument in self interest)
- Entrenching the robustness that we see in the software landscape of a mixture of licencing models into our thinking about disseminating other forms of knowledge is beneficial.
- Paradox of standardization: Standard setting is "top down", standard compliance and implementation is "bottom up".
